

Last Will and
Testament
of
Rev Burdine Blake
Decas'd.

O. Burdine Blake, son of Martinsburg in the
County of Blair and state of Pennsylvania, being
of sound mind, memory, and understanding, do
make and publish this my last will and
testament, hereby revoking and withdrawing said
old former wills by me at every time here before made.

Ired first. I direct that my body be decently interred
in the upper cemetery in North Woodbury Township, by the side of my wife
Mazy Blake dect, according to the rites and ceremonies of the M & C church
and that my funeral be conducted in a manner corresponding with
my estate and situation in life. As to such estate as it hath pleased
God to intrest me withal I dispose of the same as follows. Viz:

First. I direct all my just debts and funeral expenses, to be fully paid
and satisfied by my executors hereinafter named, as soon as conveniently
may be after my decease.

Item. I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Barbara Blake, all my
Household and Kitchen Furniture, now in the house in which I
reside (except my parlor stool, two certificates of life membership of the
Missionary Society of the M & C church, my watch, and all my books.)
I also give and bequeath to my beloved wife Barbara Blake, all the
Pork, all the Swine, the Cows, all the Horses, all the corn, as much
wheat as will keep her in bread one year, my Patent Dry House,
belonging to me at the time of my decease.

I further direct that all my real estate be sold by my executors
hereinafter named, within one year after my decease, and after
it has been converted into money, then I will and direct that the
same shall be divided as follows.

I give, devise and bequeath to my beloved wife, Barbara Blake
in addition to the above, three hundred dollars in money, and the
privilege of living in the house one year after my decease, and to have the
one half of my share of the summer grain, and the one fourth of the winter
grain, that is the $\frac{1}{4}$ of my share of the winter grain raised that year.

It is my will that my son James Blake, be released from the payment
of the account of seven thousand Dollars as charged on my Book thereby
bequeathing to him that account of seven thousand Dollars.

I give, devise and bequeath to my son William S Blake, the sum of nine
hundred Dollars. It is my will that my son Burdine Blake Jr be
released from the payment of the account of four hundred Dollars as
charged on my Book: and I bequeath to him the sum of four hundred
dollars in money.

It is my will that my daughter Mazy Ann Gentry
be released from the payment of the account of two hundred and ninety
Dollars as charged on my Book: and I bequeath to her the sum of four hundred
and ten Dollars in money. It is my will that my daughter Rebecca
Jane Hamilton be released from the payment of the account of seven hundred
and fifty dollars as charged on my book, thereby bequeathing to her that
account of seven hundred and fifty Dollars.

It is my will that my son Simon S Blake, be released from the
payment of the account of six hundred and sixty three Dollars as
charged on my book, thereby bequeathing to him that account of
six hundred and sixty three Dollars.

It is my will that my son Thomas H Blake, be released from the payment of the account of one hundred and eighty five Dollars including the note which I hold against him for part of the said account, as charged on my book, thereby bequeath-
ing to him that account (and note) of one hundred and eighty five Dollars. It is my will that my son Charles W D Blake be released from the payment of the account of four hundred and sixteen Dollars as charged on my book; and I bequeath to him the sum of three hundred Dollars, which sum of three hundred Dollars is to be deducted off the notes which I hold against him for the sum of \$900.00 and it is my will that my son Charles Blake aforesaid shall pay to my executors hereinafter named (for the use of my estate as my will provides) the balance of said notes after deducting the \$300.00 in two hundred dollar annual payments, the first payment to be made in one year after my decease.

I give, devise, and bequeath to the W & G Church the sum of one hundred dollars, to be applied to the Missionary cause.

I give, devise, and bequeath to my Grand-Son Bur-

dine Blake, (son of James Blake) my silver Watch.

It is my will that my Books, comprising my Library, be distributed among my children as they may see proper to select.

All the rest, residue, and remainder of my personal estate, what-
soever and wheresoever, I order and direct to be converted into money
by public sale the soon as the same can conveniently be done
after my decease, of all the rest, residue, and remainder of money
remaining in my executors hands after settling up my estate as
directed aforesaid, I give and bequeath the whole of said remain-
der to my eight children, James Blake, W H S Blake, Burdine Blake, Jr.,
Henry Penn Gray, Rebecca Jane Hamilton, Elizur S Blake, Horace
W Blake, and Charles W D Blake, share and share alike.

Lastly, I appoint my esteemed sons William H S Blake & Burdine
Blake, to be the executors of this my last will and Testament.

and seal, this 3rd day of December A.D. one thousand eight hun-
dred and sixty nine.

Codicil.

I, Burdine Blake, son, the within named testator, do hereby make and publish this Codicil to my last will and testament, bearing date the third day of December A.D. 1818, in manner following to witness: Whereas in my said will I directed that all my real estate be sold by my executors therein named, within one year after my decease, reserving the privilege for my wife Barbara Blake, to live in the house situated in Martinsburg, Blair Co., for one year after my decease. I do hereby revoke the aforesaid so far as it relates to the land which I now own in Martinsburg Borough aforesaid, and the dwelling house and other buildings thereto belonging, and I do hereby declare that my will is, and I do hereby give, devise, and bequeath to her, my said wife, Barbara Blake, the use, improvement, and income of my dwelling house and land, situated in Martinsburg Borough aforesaid, and the appurtenances thereto belonging: To have and to hold the same for and during her natural life, and after her death the same to be sold by my executors named in said will, and to be divided as therein directed.

Also, I do hereby revoke the bequest, in my said will contained, to my grand son, Burdine Blake (son of James Blake) of my silver watch, and order and direct that the same shall be sold by my executors for the use of my estate, as my will provides for the payment of debts &c, and do hereby ratify and confirm my will in all other respects.
