WILLIAM BRINTON - ANN BAGLEY

William Brinton, son of Thomas Brinton and Ann Biddle or Biddulph, daughter of William, was baptized December 1, 1636, at the church of Sedgely Parish, county of Stratford, England. He was married in 1659, in England, by Friends' ceremony, to Ann Bagley, daughter of Edward Bagley of Sedgely who, as his son-in-law notes, was "a man of good account as to worldly rank". Both died in Birmingham, Pennsylvania, and are buried there. William died in 1699, and his wife predeceased him by one year.

In the spring of 1684 William embarked for Penn's colony, with his wife and son, and leaving his three daughters in England. The daughters came to this country later, probably in 1685 or 1686. William Brinton took his Friends' certificates to Philadelphia Monthly Meeting, so this must have been the place of his landing. Looking for a place to settle, he chose to erect a temporary shelter near a little stream which marked the beginning of good land, and there the family spent the first winter. According to a newspaper report of the 1974 Brinton family reunion (held annually) the stream was the Brandywine Creek, and the first winter's shelter was in a cave. The weather was cold and severe, there were no white neighbors and no provisions, only the forest around them, but there were friendly Indians nearby who supplied them with game.

The next summer (1685) he made a clearing, built a log cabin and planted a pear tree before his door, which survived until 1852. In Philadelphia he obtained a patent for 400 acres of land around his cabin, extending from the Birmingham and Thornbury Township line west toward the Brandywine. Later he added to this, until he had 1,000 acres.

Randal Vernon, "Weaver", was born in Sandyway, Cheshire, England in 1640. Randal Vernon of Marsden, England and Sarah Bradshaw of Standthorn, England, married 14 9mo. 1670, at the house of Thomas Vernon at Standthorn.

Randal Vernon and his family sailed from England on "The Friendship of Liverpool", Robert Crossman, Master, which is presumed to have arrived 14 August 1682 at Upland, Pennsylvania. It is recorded that he shipped the following goods on "The Friendship of Liverpool": 1 fardel (parcel) qty. 30 lbs. woolen cloth; 10 ells English linen; $\frac{1}{4}$ cwt. wrought iron; 2 dozen stockings for men.

"Welcome Society" The Friendship of Liverpool was one of the 24 known ships that sailed from England, arriving December, 1681 through December, 1682 with passengers to establish William Penn's "Holy Experiment" in Pennsylvania. These 24 ships made up "William Penn's Fleet", and descendants of the passengers on these ships are eligible to become members of the "Welcome Society". Descendants of both Randal and Thomas Vernon are already listed among members.

Randal Vernon from Sandyway, his brother Thomas Vernon from Standthorne, and Robert Vernon from Stoke, all in Cheshire, England, were joint First Purchasers of 1500 acres. They settled on adjoining tracts of land in Nether Providence Township, Delaware (formerly Chester) County, Pennsylvania. Each of the brothers had purchased grants of 625 acres of land from William Penn at Twelve pounds ten shillings. The date of the grant for Randal Vernon is recorded as 3 March 1681. At a meeting of Penn's Commissioners, 11 1mo. 1680/1, a "warrant was ordered to lay out to Robert, Thomas and Randal Vernon, their lotts and liberty land". It was not until 1701/2 that the resurvey was completed. In no case was the entire 625 acres in one location, but each of the brothers received a tract of about 300 acres in Nether Providence Township, located side by side. Randal Vernon's tract in Nether Providence was comprised of 298 acres, and was recorded in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, "19th of 9ber 1711".

RANDAL VERNON, continued

Randal Vernon also had a tract of 531 acres in Edgemont Township, Patent dated 5-31-1712, and as part of the purchase from William Penn, a plot of ground on each side of Edgemont St., Chester, Pennsylvania.

In 1684 the Chester Courts appointed collectors "to gather the assessments". One of these collectors was Randal Vernon "for Ridley and in the woods". In 1685, Randal Vernon, Caleb Pusey and Walter Faucit held office as "peace makers". Their sittings became such a business that it was known as "the Monthly Court".

From the minutes of the 11th mo. 1683 Chester Monthly Meeting held at Robert Wade's house, "It was agreed that Randal Vernon (and others) doe look out a piece of Land for a Buriall Ground & bring in their accompt thereof at ye next monthly meeting."

In 1690 he gave three pounds sterling towards the construction of Chester Meeting, more than most friends gave. He was on the Collecting Committee and was treasurer of Chester Meeting in 1692.

From the minutes of the 3^{mo}. 1698 Chester Quarterly Meeting, "Chester Monthly Meeting being called, Chester Friends desire their weekly meeting being the second 5th day of each at Randal Vernon's, it may be removed to the new meeting house, which this meeting doth allow off."

In 1687, Randal Vernon was a member of the Pennsylvania Assembly from Chester County.

Will of Randal Vernon, dated 2^{6mo}. 1715, and probated 4 May 1725: I Randal Vernon of Nether Providence in Chester County and province of Pensilvania yeoman, being sick and weak of Body, but of perfect Mind and Memory... ..I give and bequeath unto Sarah my Wife Twenty pounds annum to be paid unto her use and Service yearly and every year during her natural Life, of a Sufficient Maintenance dureing her Life..... I give and bequeath unto my daughter Hannah and her Husband Caleb Harrison five Shillings apiece, and no more. . I give and bequeath unto my Sone Jacob Vernon five Shillings, and no more. . I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Sarah and her Husband Jacob Howell five shillings apiece and no more. . 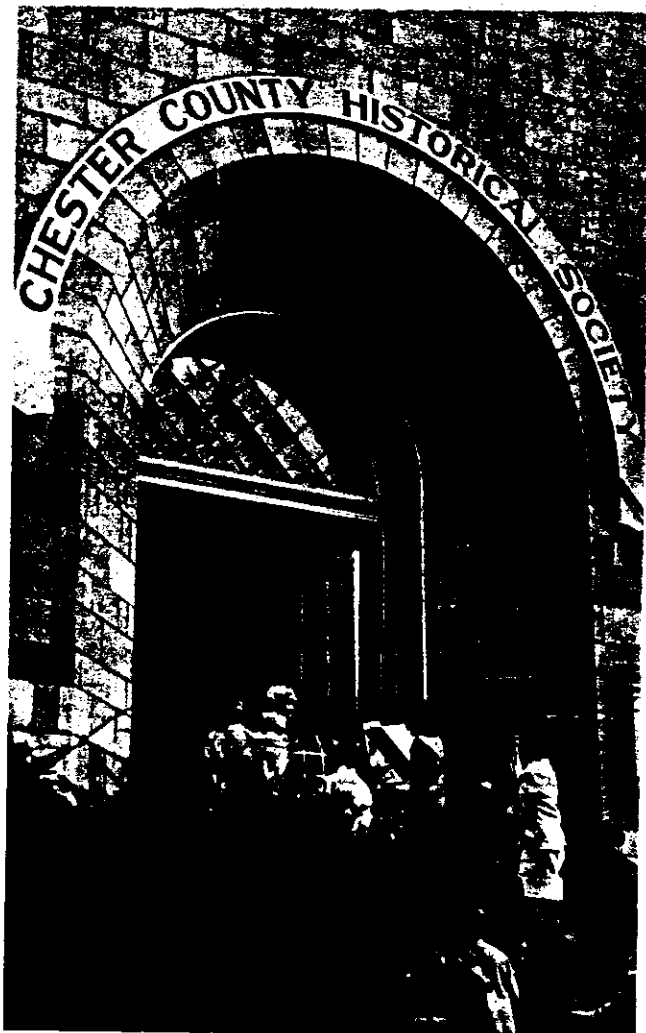
WILLIAM BRINTON (Jr.) - JANE THATCHER

William Brinton, the only son of William and Ann Brinton, was born in Worcestershire, England.

He came to America with his parents in 1684. In 1690 William Brinton (Jr.) and Jane Thatcher were married, according to Friends' ceremony and tradition. He was prominent in the affairs of Chester County, and in 1713 he was a member of Assembly from Chester County, Pennsylvania.

In 1704 he built a new home which is still standing and is the property of the Chester County Historical Society. Known as the Brinton House, it is located about four miles south of West Chester. The house was constructed of stone from a nearby quarry. The walls are 22 inches thick and the 27 windows are leaded. Its furnishings and accessories are typical of those which were made or used in the area during the first half of the 18th century and are based on inventories taken after the deaths of William Brinton (the builder) in 1751 and his widow in 1756. The barn of the Brinton House contains a Conestoga wagon, early fire fighting equipment and other vehicles, as well as exhibits of early farm tools. It is open for tours May 1 to November 1.

I have been told that the records of the Brintons as outstanding citizens would qualify descendants for membership in the National Society of Colonial Dames.

THE BRINTON HOUSE

The Brinton House built in 1704 by William Brinton, is about 4 miles south of West Chester on Oakland Road (the old Wilmington Pike), near Dilworthtown, just off Route 202.

The house is built of stone from a nearby quarry, with walls 22" thick. Leaded glass is used in its 27 windows.

It was restored to its original dimensions by G. Edwin Brumbaugh in 1954. The furnishings, based on inventories taken after the death of William Brinton in 1751 and of his widow in 1756, are typical of those used in Chester

County during the early 18th century.

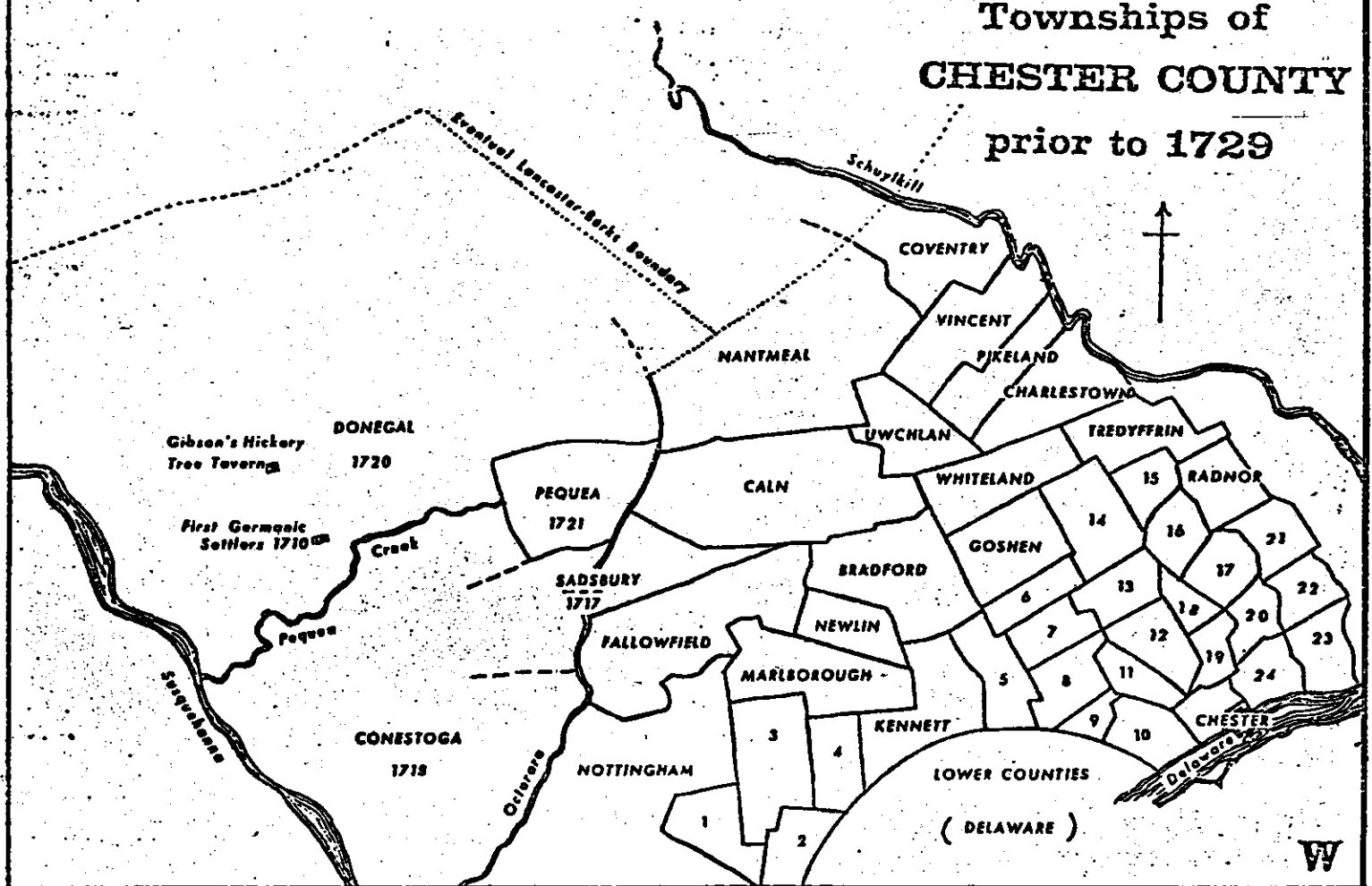

PETITION TO ERECT A NEW COUNTY OUT OF UPPER CHESTER COUNTY

At a Council held at Philadelphia, February 6th, 1729,

A petition of the inhabitants of the upper parts of Chester County was laid before the Board and read, setting forth, that by reason of their great distance from the county town, where Courts are held, offices are kept, and annual elections made, they lie under very great inconveniences, being obliged in the recovery of their just debts, to travel near one hundred miles to obtain a writ; that for want of a sufficient number of Justices, Constables and other officers, in those parts, no care is taken of the high-ways; Townships are not laid out, nor bridges built, when there is an apparent necessity for them; and further that for want of a Gaol there, several vagabonds and other dissolute people harbour among them, thinking themselves safe from justice in so remote a place; and therefore praying that a Division Line be made between the upper and lower part of said county, and the upper part thereof erected into a county, with all the immunities, rights and privileges which any other county of this Province does now enjoy.

RICHARD WOODWARD - MARY NAYLE

The Woodwards were of English descent, and were prominent citizens of Chester County as early as 1687. Robert Woodward was our ancestor, and was listed as being of Rockland Manor, New Castle, Delaware, and Chester County, Pennsylvania. I could not find any mention of the date when they came to this country, but I did read about the settling of Delaware and that settlers of Delaware came from New England. Since there were Woodwards in New England, and supposedly the first Woodward in this country was in New England, I have wondered if our Woodward ancestors in Pennsylvania did settle earlier in New England. They were members of the Society of Friends.

Richard Woodward of Westtown was born in 1673, the son of Robert. In 1705 he married Mary Nayle according to Quaker customs and tradition. Mary was born in 1684, the only heir of Henry and Deborah Nayle. Her father was evidently not a member of the Society of Friends, as he left money in his will to St. John's Episcopal Church, Concord, Chester County, Pennsylvania. Henry Nayle was also prominent in the affairs of Chester County, serving as Justice of the Peace. In Henry Nayle's will, dated 11 June 1726, Thornbury, Chester County, he left his Plantation of 200 acres to his grandson John Woodward, at the age of 21.

Richard Woodward was very active in the affairs of Chester County. He was often a member of the Petty Jury and also of the Grand Jury. He was appointed as one of the supervisors to lay out a road in Chester County. In 1706 he was appointed as one of the overseers of the poor for the township of Middletown. He also was a constable for Thornbury. His will was proven 19 October 1748.

John Brinton was the son of William and Jane (Thatcher) Brinton, and was born in Chester County, Pennsylvania. He married, in 1736, at Concord Meeting, Hannah Vernon, daughter of Jacob and Ann (Yearsley) Vernon, of Thornbury. They lived on a farm of two hundred acres in Kennett Township, about a mile below the forks of the Brandywine. Their son John inherited the property and lived there many years.

One of their daughters was Lydia, who married Nayle (Neal) Woodward, son of John Woodward.

After the death of her husband, John Brinton, Hannah married John Woodward. They were complained of by Birmingham Meeting, 7 3mo. 1750, for marriage by a priest in only eight months after the death of John Woodward's former wife, Anne Pyle. They were disowned but were re-instated later.

John Woodward, son of Richard and Mary (Nayle) Woodward, married Ann Pyle, daughter of William Pyle of Thornbury, in 1729. One of their sons was Nayle (also called Neal) Woodward. After the death of Ann in 1749, John Woodward married Hannah Brinton, widow of John Brinton. They were complained of by Birmingham Monthly Meeting, and disowned, early in 1750 for marriage by a priest and eight months after the death of his former wife. In 1753 they made acknowledgment and received again with their small children.

One of Hannah Brinton's daughters was Lydia Brinton. John Woodward's son Nayle and Hannah Brinton Woodward's daughter Lydia Brinton (step-brother and step-sister) were married in 1754, and one of their daughters was Sarah Woodward, who married Thomas Baker in 1785 and moved to Clifton, Greene County, Ohio, in 1812.

Joshua Baker's residence was Cashel, Ireland, at the time of his marriage to Margery Knight of Bandon Bridge, Ireland. They brought a certificate of membership from Friends of Waterford, Ireland, dated 13 2nd mo. 1712, and probably lived a few years in Philadelphia. Some time prior to 1728 they settled in Christiana Hundred, New Castle County. Joshua Baker's will was proved 11 December 1776.

George Carter from Buckleberry in Berkshire, England, purchased land in Bradford on the east branch of the Brandywine in 1714, and there died about the close of the year 1726. The maiden name of his wife, according to tradition, was Elizabeth Tull. She married a second husband, James Jeffries, 3 March 1728, and survived him many years. George Carter was a yeoman (farmer).

George Carter received a warrant for 250 acres, dated September 1714, in the right of William Bryant.

"To wife Elizabeth, the home plantation. Eldest daughter Ann, daughters Rachil, Elizabeth and Mary. Eldest son George, the upper plantation. Son John, my share of the mill."

RICHARD BAKER - RACHEL CARTER MARSHALL

Richard Baker, born 17 2 mo. 1721, was the son of Joshua and Margery (Knight) Baker. By occupation he was a joiner--a carpenter, especially one who finishes interior woodwork, etc. Richard Baker of Christiana Hundred in the County of Newcastle, upon the Delaware, married, 7 11 mo. 1754, Rachel (Carter) Marshall (widow) of West Bradford, (now Pocopson), in the County of Chester, Pennsylvania. He received a certificate from Newark Monthly Meeting to Bradford, 1 2mo. 1755. He was prominent in the affairs of Chester County, and was appointed a Justice of the Peace, 23 May 1770.

On September 11, 1777, the army of Cornwallis took 5 horses and 40 pounds of cheese from Richard Baker. The index of taxables found at the Chester County Historical Society has listings for Richard Baker for: 1778 (Plundered) and 1779 (Plundered). The Bradford Monthly Meeting complained against Richard Baker March 14, 1782 for taking the test (oath of allegiance). He died November 18, 1803. He willed to his son Thomas, among other things, his "clock". Rachel died September 29, 1799.

THOMAS BAKER - SARAH WOODWARD

Thomas Baker was born December 18, 1762, the son of Richard and Rachel Carter Marshall Baker. He fought in the American Revolution, and this service has been verified by the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution--he is listed in the Third Supplement to the DAR Patriot Index. He must have been a very young soldier. Margaret Welch Kahoe sent me a copy of an old paper which told of Thomas's experiences in the War. This old paper was among the belongings of William Baker, son of George and Elizabeth Higginson Baker, and grandson of Isaac. A copy of this paper is included here.

Thomas Baker married Sarah Woodward, daughter of Nayle and Lydia (Brinton) Woodward, on the 7th day, 4th mo. 1785. On the 19th day, 6th mo., 1794, Bradford Monthly Meeting (Friends) issued a certificate of removal to Thomas Baker with his wife Sarah and 5 children--George, Joshua, Lydia, Rachel, and Richard. This certificate was received and recorded in London Grove Monthly Meeting on the 2nd day, 7th mo., 1794. On June 19, 1811 he sold land in Chester County, Pennsylvania deed recorded September 2, 1811. This must have been in preparation for moving to Ohio in 1812.

They must have moved to Ohio after the marriage of their daughter Lydia to Thomas Suplee, by Moses Marshall, on March 5, 1812, in Pennsylvania. The Suplee family remained in Pennsylvania, and Lydia is buried in Friends Burial Ground in Darby, Pennsylvania.

Thomas and Sarah and family, together with four grandchildren, moved to Clifton, Greene County, Ohio. On September 26, 1815 Thomas was appointed guardian of the four grandchildren, children of his deceased son George. Thomas died in Clifton September 22, 1821. Sarah died October 19, 1828. Both are buried at Clifton.

George Baker was the oldest son of Thomas and Sarah Baker. There was only one marriage record found for a George Baker, and this was to Catherine McIver, February 18, 1805, by Moses Marshall, Justice of the Peace, who later performed the marriage ceremony for George's sister Lydia. The Friends did not believe in sons marrying before the age of 21. It has been impossible to locate any McIver information.

When Thomas was leaving for Ohio in 1812, they arrived in Philadelphia, where George learned the War of 1812 had started. Thomas took George's family to Ohio, and George enlisted in the War. He was sent with his regiment into Canada. At the Battle of the Thames he received a rifle bayonet through one lung. Discharged with honors, he came to his father's home near Clifton, Ohio, and died soon after. He left four children, and his father, Thomas, was appointed their guardian in 1815. No mention was made of his wife, and she did not appear on the 1820 census.

JOHN GRAHAM - MARY RYAN

John Graham was born in Virginia in July, 1777, but by the late 1790's he was living in Kentucky, where he married Mary Ryan, who was born in Pennsylvania in 1782-83. (The 1850 census listed her age as 67.) I have not been able to locate the marriage record in Kentucky, although I have tried a number of counties. They probably married in 1797.

According to Dill's "History of Greene County" the family moved to Ohio in 1802-03, and settled on the Xenia Road, two miles south of Yellow Springs. John died in 1839, and Mary died in 1864 in Warren County, Illinois, where she had gone to live with her younger son, Forqus. Forqus and his family moved to Illinois and then on west to Utah and California. They became members of the Mormon Church. A great-great-granddaughter of Forqus contacted me several years ago concerning family history--she was Paula Smith, born 1951, in Long Beach, California.

I do not know the names of either set of parents. There were a number of Grahams in Virginia, and several were named John. Several names appear at least twice in the names among the various descendant lines, and I wonder if they are significant. "John Ryan" is repeated--this could have been the name of Mary's father, or it could have been the combination of John Graham's first name and Mary's last name. "Charles West", or "Charles Westly" appears, as does the name "Forqus. There is a listing in the DAR Patriot Index for an Arthur Graham, who married Mary Forqus, and it is possible they could be John's parents, but up to the present I have had no success in proving this.

ISAAC BAKER - ELIZA GRAHAM

Isaac Baker, born May 3, 1807 in Chester County, Pennsylvania, was the son of George Baker and presumably Catherine McIver Baker. Isaac was the oldest son--the names of his brother and sisters were names that appear in the Baker ancestors, but Isaac is not found anywhere. I have felt that perhaps he was named for his mother's father (his brother was named for George's father) and that this might be a clue to learning her identity. But I cannot find any listing of a McIver family, and I have wondered if her father had died and her mother re-married. On the 1880 census, Isaac reported that his mother was born in Pennsylvania.

Isaac moved to Ohio with his paternal grandparents in 1812. His father died in 1814, and in 1815 his grandfather was appointed guardian of Isaac and his brother Thomas and two sisters Hannah and Lydia. He married Eliza Graham, and they lived a short distance south of Yellow Springs, just south of John Graham's property, according to the 1850 map of Greene County.

Isaac and Eliza had nine children, six sons and three daughters. Five of the six sons were in the Civil War. I have indicated three I know served in the war. Their son John lost his life in the Battle of Cedar Creek, October 19, 1864. He served three years, four months and fifteen days. I have his sword, and I hope to be able to place it in the Museum in Xenia.

Isaac was listed as a farmer on the 1880 census, and son Joseph lived with his parents, and was listed as a plasterer.

My mother said her grandfather Gebauer was a member of the Junkers, an elite army group. Dorothea's maiden name of Whiele was taken from the death record of her daughter Helen. Since Helen named her son Albert, and Albert was not a Baker family name, I think he was probably named for Helen's father, -----Gebauer, who must have died in Prussia, and Dorothea married Gotlieb Gerhardt before coming to this country. The Gerhardts were not listed in the 1860 census. They settled near Ironton and Hanging Rock, Lawrence County, Ohio. In the Index to Deeds, Gotlieb Gerhardt is listed as a grantee in the 1860's, and as a grantor in 1876, with wife Dorothea also signing. The estate of Gotlieb, deceased, was administered in 1878, and a guardian appointed for Rosalind and Charles. I do not know whether Dorothea had died by that date or not. Charles Gerhardt was listed with the William P. Baker family in Yellow Springs in the June, 1880 census. I assume he was making his home with them by that time, and that both his parents were deceased.

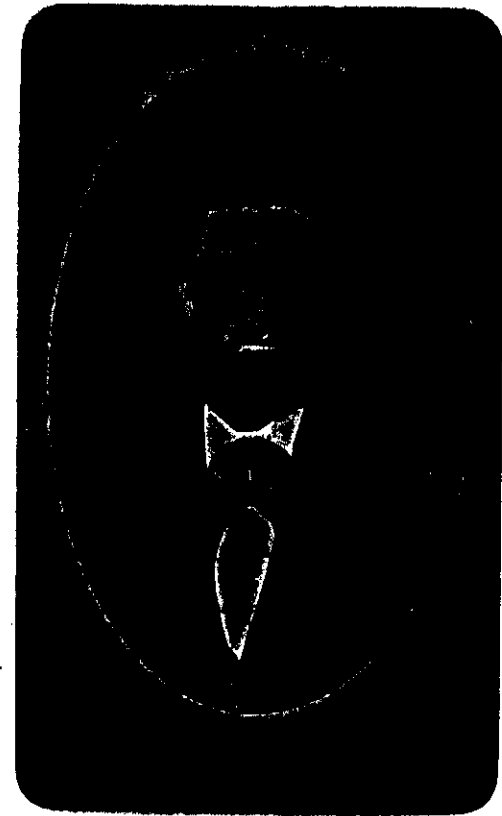
Helen Gebauer came to this country with her mother, stepfather, and sisters between 1860 and 1864, settling in Lawrence County, near Hanging Rock and Ironton. Helen became a mother's helper to the ---Means family, and when they moved to Yellow Springs, she went with them. The Means family had three small daughters, Gertrude, Pearl, and Patricia. Helen became almost a member of the family, and her wedding was held at the Means home. Their son Albert was given the middle name Means, and their daughter was named for all three of the Means daughters. I myself was named Helen for my grandmother, and my middle name is also Means. The Means family was not related to our family.

William Penn Baker was the son of Isaac and Eliza (Graham) Baker. He was a painter and paperhanger. He and his wife lived very near Antioch College, where their children and their daughter's children were born. Both their son and daughter were graduates of Antioch College. William died July 1, 1907 in the Xenia Hospital. Helen finally went to Wisconsin to live with her daughter's family, and died there July 31, 1925. After her death the home property was sold to Antioch College, and the house was called Baker House for a number of years, but it was finally razed and another building now stands there.
