The group will hold their next meeting in October.

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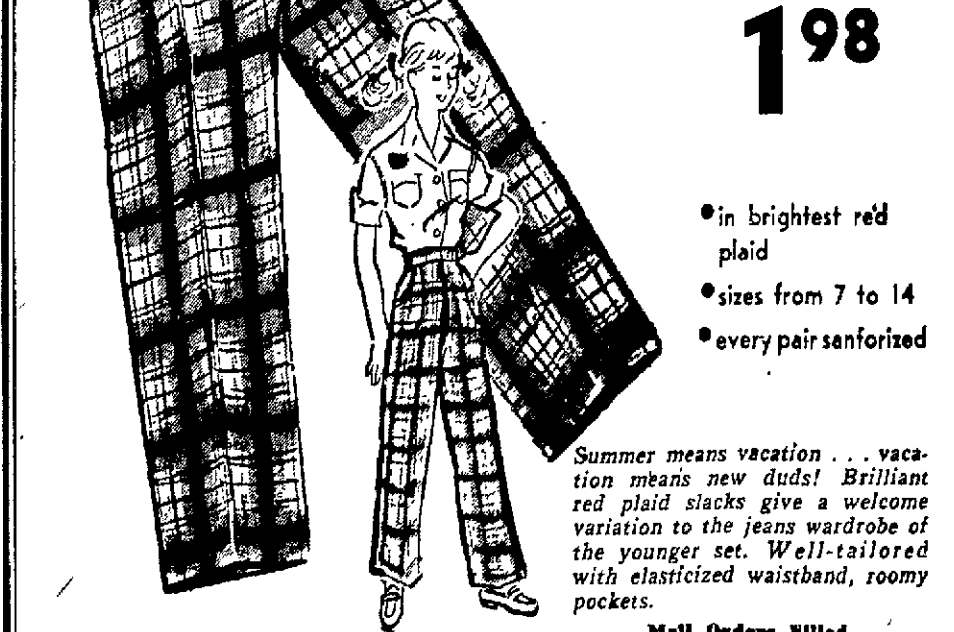


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Bunko 12 Club at Thompson Home
